Re: Evidence of cluster munitions in South Kordofan

Excellency,

The Cluster Munition Coalition, a global civil society campaign working to eradicate cluster munitions, is deeply concerned about evidence that the air force of Sudan has used cluster munitions in the Nuba mountains (South Kordofan) in February and March of this year. We call on Sudan to stop using this weapon immediately.

Cluster munitions are indiscriminate at the time of attack and they leave behind highly explosive duds that are equally indiscriminate. Most casualties from cluster remnants are civilians and many of these are children. The weapon is banned under International Humanitarian Law and should not be used under any circumstances.

According to an investigation by Human Rights Watch¹, government aircraft dropped two bombs in Tongoli village (Delami county) on 6 March, and four others on Rajeefi village (Um Durein county) in late February. The attacks destroyed homes and other civilian property. The cluster bombs found appear to be Soviet-made RBK-500 cluster bombs, containing AO-2.5 RT fragmentation submunitions, the same kind found in the region in 2012.

In addition to ceasing all use, Sudan should investigate reports of use and make findings public. For the safety of your own people, please ensure the clearance of cluster munition remnants in affected areas, destroy your stockpiles of the weapon, and provide support to any victims.

On many occasions since the Convention was adopted in 2008, Sudan has indicated its intention to join the Convention on Cluster Munitions. We encourage Sudan to join the Convention and to respect the ban on cluster munitions, as an important step to minimize the suffering caused by the ongoing conflict.
